



Call for Proposals – Gardiner Museum Curatorial Residency

The Gardiner Museum is seeking proposals for the inaugural Gardiner Museum Curatorial Residency.

ABOUT THE GARDINER MUSEUM

The Gardiner Museum wants people to experience ceramics as an art form that has enriched life for thousands of years, and as a craft that remains a vital medium for creativity. The Museum stewards an incredibly important collection, connecting visitors to the fundamental role of ceramics in many cultures throughout history, and offers special temporary displays, many highlighting the relevancy of ceramics to contemporary life. THE GARDINER MUSEUM CURATORIAL RESIDENCY

The Gardiner Museum Curatorial Residency will provide the successful applicant with a paid opportunity to conceive, research, and produce a small-scale museum exhibition and gain experience in a professional environment. The aims of the residency are: to create an opportunity for aspiring and emerging curators; to promote new approaches to the study and presentation of ceramics; and to support a new, diverse generation of curators by offering them an opportunity to communicate their ideas to a broad public.

RESIDENCY DESCRIPTION

The outcome of the Curatorial Residency will be an exhibition, which will be presented at the Museum once the Residency is complete. The exhibition should focus on clay or ceramic works, works that are primarily ceramic, or ceramic works in context with other objects or artworks. The theme should be of contemporary relevance and informed by the latest scholarship, whether the actual objects are historical or contemporary.

The Curatorial Residency has two components to achieve this goal. The first is a travel component of approximately 2-6 weeks, with financial support for the selected applicant's travel outside of Canada to research their exhibition, including visiting other museums. This invaluable experience will enhance the exhibition, deepen its scholarship, and provide a unique opportunity for professional and personal growth.

The second component will be 3-5 months of full-time work at the Gardiner Museum. This period of the residency will focus on the research, development, writing and realization phases of the exhibition, along with participation in the regular curatorial operations of the Museum, through which the selected applicant will gain broader exposure to Museum practice.

The Curatorial Resident will also give at least one public presentation about their exhibition and contribute to the Gardiner's digital platforms with content about their project.

BUDGET

The total Residency budget is \$45,000 CAD.

The Curatorial Resident will receive \$25,000 CAD which will cover accommodation, travel, and all research expenses in the travel phase of the residency, as well as all cost of living, salary, and outside research costs for the time spent in Toronto at the Gardiner Museum. These funds will be directly managed by the Curatorial Resident, with distribution and accountability guidelines specified at the time of acceptance. While all situations differ and thus budget allocations can vary, the program is designed for the successful applicant to receive a living wage while in Toronto.

An additional \$20,000 CAD is available for the exhibition and will be managed by the Gardiner Museum. These funds will cover any exhibition-related expenses, including but not limited to: loan fees, exhibition rights fees (CARFAC), transportation of artworks, conservation, installation, image permissions, publication, graphics and design, printing, additional equipment, etc.

WHO CAN APPLY

The Curatorial Residency is open to Canadians who are enrolled in, or have recently graduated from a Master's program in museum studies, curatorial studies, or art history; doctoral candidates or recent graduates in those fields (within a year of graduation); and those pursuing independent or community-based curatorial work at the early stages of their career. The residency seeks to build upon previous training and experiences while creating an opportunity for aspiring curators to enter the field. Applicants should have some demonstrated commitment to presenting visual arts in exhibition contexts, although not necessarily specific experience with ceramics.

PROPOSAL REQUIREMENTS

Interested applicants are required to please submit the following:

1. Cover letter (one page) providing a narrative description of background, training, relevant curatorial work and career objectives emphasising how the residency will help you achieve these goals.
2. CV (up to 5 pages)
3. Exhibition proposal, which should include the proposed concept and research plan with a description of the travel to be undertaken (Maximum length: 1000 words), work schedule (1 page), and budget (1 page) accounting for the full \$45,000 available. Further details about the exhibition proposal and budget are explained below.
4. A writing sample from a curatorial, academic, or related project. Maximum length 4000 words.
5. A signed Agreement to Propose and Consent form (attached in Appendix B)

Please submit materials as a single digital PDF. Complete submissions must be received by the Gardiner Museum by **5pm EST on January 31, 2022**, to be considered. Incomplete submissions will be subject to disqualification. All submission materials will be retained by the Gardiner Museum. The selected applicant will be notified mid-February.

EXHIBITION PROPOSAL

Budget

Please provide a detailed budget for use of the available funds as described above.

Location

The Curatorial Resident will develop an exhibition for the Museum's lobby space. This includes a wall case and free-standing cases (see Appendix A for images and details). The final layout must follow accessibility standards used by the Museum.

Design Elements

The exhibition will include didactic and interpretive wall text and graphic elements of content. If the proposed exhibition has complex display considerations, either built or audiovisual, these must be described and accounted for in the budget.

Exhibition Checklist

Objects can come exclusively from the Gardiner's permanent collection; borrowed from private collections, artists and/or institutions; or a combination of Gardiner objects and works loaned from other institutions and collections. If including loans from artists or private collections, the proposal and budget must demonstrate the viability of such loans within the project budget, and how appropriate conservation and security standards will be met.

The selection of objects and their number should consider the spaces restrictions of the exhibition space (see appendix A)

Publication

Publications (virtual or printed) may be included in the proposals at the discretion of the applicant. If a publication is anticipated, it would need to be realized within the overall project budget and timeline.

Presentation Date

We ask you to plan for the exhibition to be installed and open at the Museum at the end of the Residency (September – December 2022), however, the arrangement of loans may necessitate presentation later. Alternate timelines can be confirmed as plans develop and the project progresses.

Schedule

Please provide a proposed schedule for the residency, from the travel/research component to the anticipated opening date of the exhibition (September 2022).

Staff Support

While Gardiner staff will support the full and successful realization of the project, proposals must be structured in a way that the Curatorial Resident is able to lead on the research, administration, content development, and logistics of the exhibition.

SELECTION PROCESS

Imagination, creativity, and innovation are essential to any proposal selected. The applicant's desire to communicate with an audience and to share a thought-provoking vision is an imperative consideration.

Applications will be assessed based on the following criteria:

- Merit
- Benefit to the candidate
- Benefit to the Museum and its audience
- Originality of exhibition concept
- Feasibility of the exhibition within budget and timeframe

- Potential for scholarly or cultural contribution

The Gardiner Museum is committed to an inclusive work environment and encourages applications from applicants who identify as Black, Indigenous or as a person of colour.

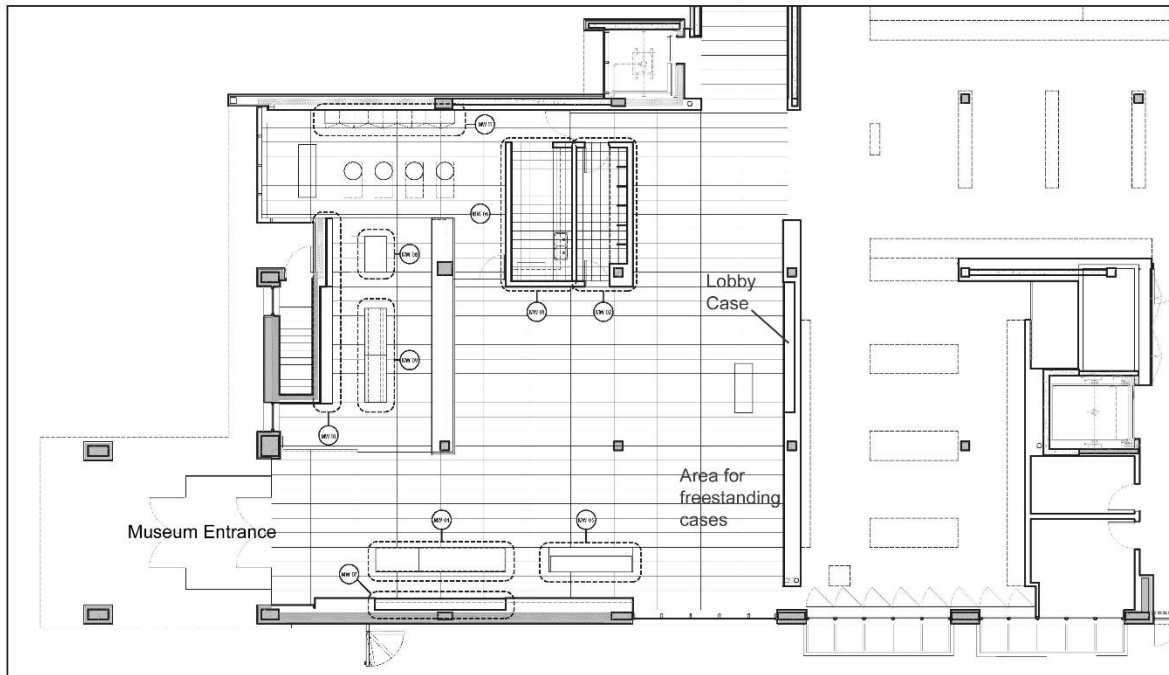

The wall case is located in the Gardiner Museum lobby and is visible upon entrance to the Museum. There is also an area to the south of the case that is available for freestanding cases.



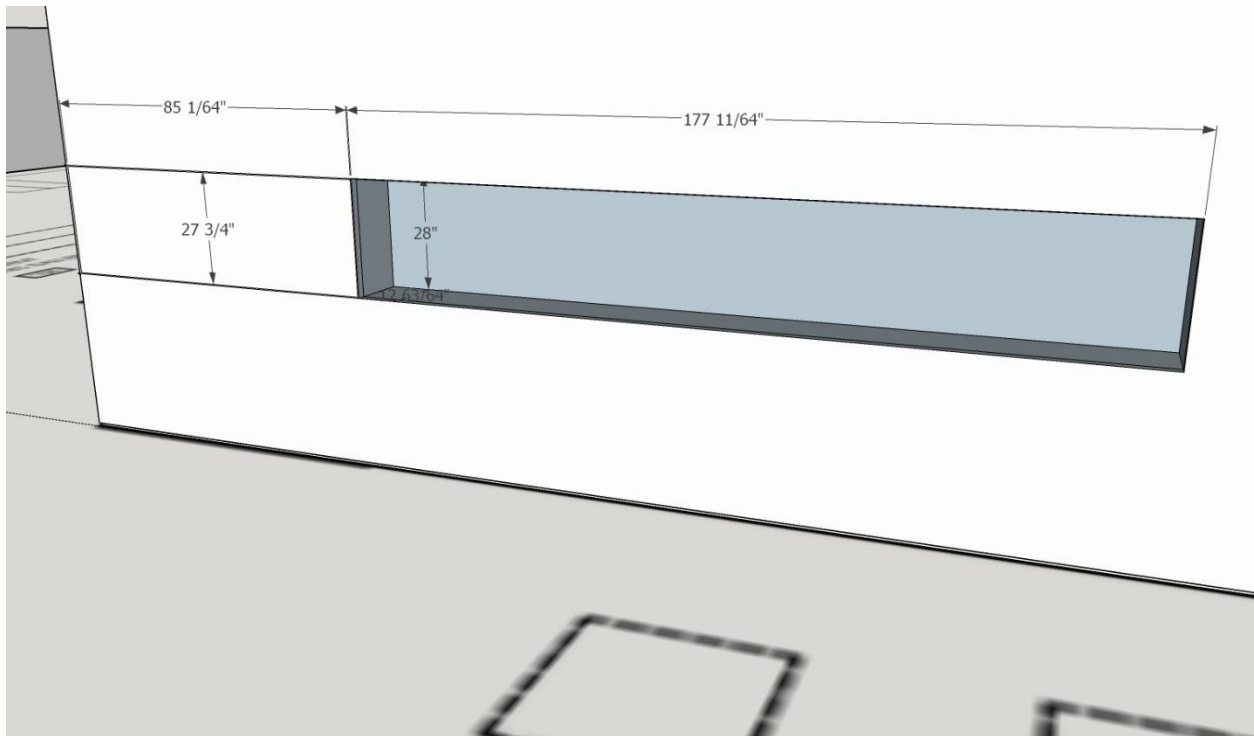
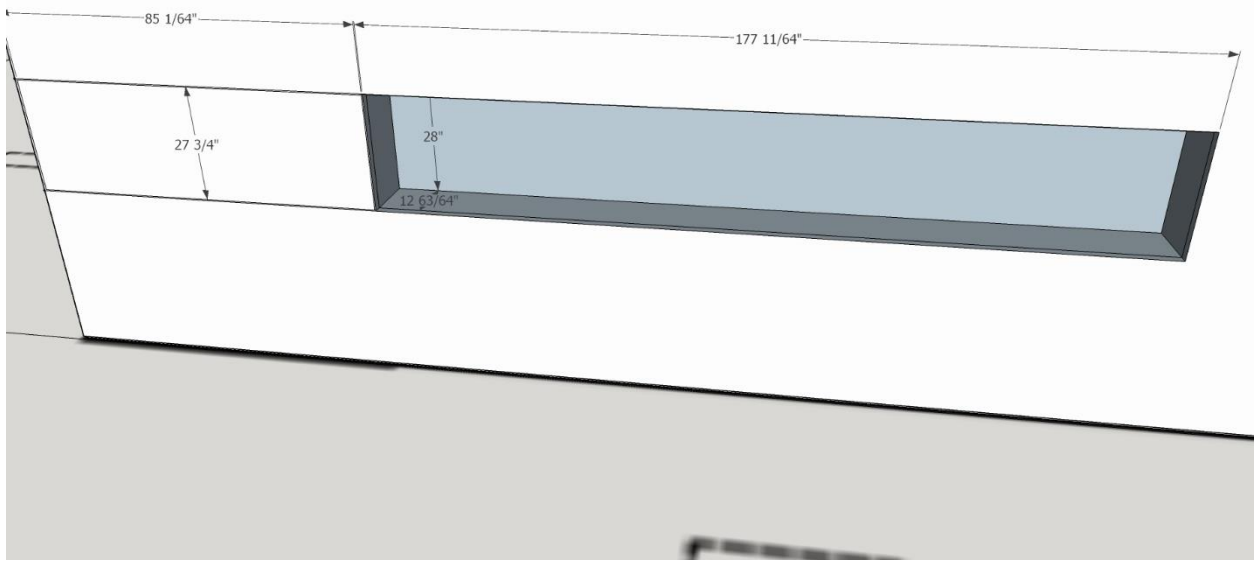
Wall Case Measurements of case:
